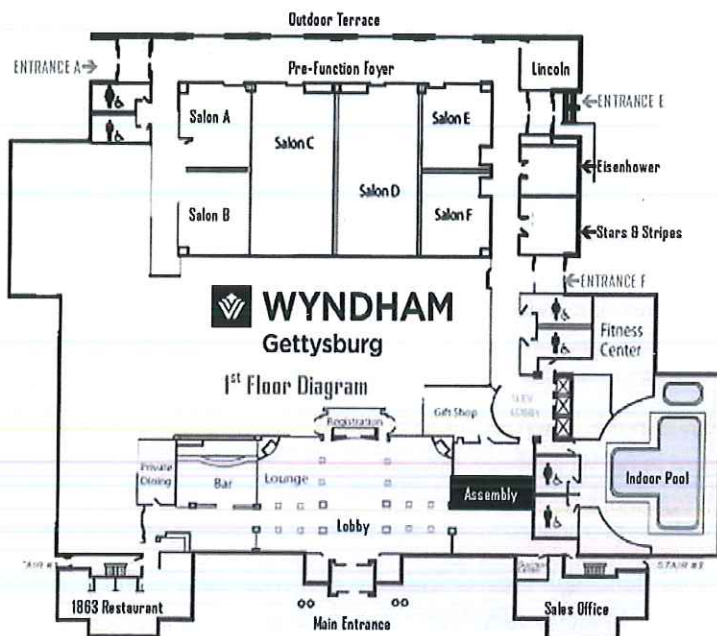

*Pennsylvania Hall, on the campus of Gettysburg College, ca 1862.*

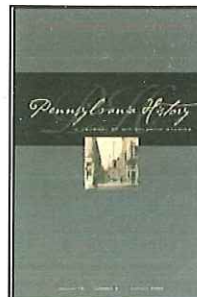
## Wyndham Gettysburg Floor Plan
