Plenary

"Practical Friends in Early America"

American Friends engaged in multivalent spiritual practices at the same time their Society underwent drastic transformations during the antebellum era, including evangelical religion, class formation, print culture and progressive reform. Schism and division led to the creation of new forms of Quakerism: Hicksite, Orthodox, Gurneyite, Wilburite, and Progressive. This varied religiosity among Friends resulted in the increasing complexity of American Quakerism by the mid-nineteenth century.

About Prof. Lindman

Prof. Lindman's primary research interests include women in early America, gender history, religious history, the history of the body, and the history of masculinity. Most recently, Prof. Lindman authored A Vivifying Spirit: Quaker Practice and Reform in Antebellum America (Penn State University Press. 2022). She is co-editor of A Centre of Wonders: The Body in Early America (Cornell University Press, 2001) and the author of Bodies of Belief: Baptist Community in Early America (University of Pennsylvania Press, 2008). She is the author of many book chapters and articles, some of which have appeared in prestigious journals including the William and Mary Quarterly, the Journal of the Early America Republic, and the Journal of Social History. She received her B.A. from St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota, and her M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota.
