# Our Hosts Greater Harrisburg

Dear Colleagues,

From our first annual meeting in 1933 at Lehigh University to today, the Pennsylvania Historical Association has presented high quality meetings and an award-winning journal. Our 90th meeting is no exception and will be appropriately held in a southcentral location in our Commonwealth, where we will gather from all over the state and beyond.

Our state government chose Harrisburg in 1810 as Pennsylvania's capitol on land donated by John Harris II, due in part to its geographic location between Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. It has been home to the Native American town of Peshtank. Beginning in 1719 it became the frontier town of Harris' Ferry; in the nineteenth century a crossroads of commerce; and also a hub on the Underground Railroad. It accommodated Camp Curtin, the largest northern Civil War camp in the nation. It was General Lee's goal before being thwarted at Gettysburg. During the Progressive Era, J. Horace McFarland and Mira Lloyd Dock used the city as the national poster child for the "City Beautiful" Movement. Harrisburg garnered national and international headlines as the closest large city in proximity to the Three Mile Island Nuclear Incident in 1979.

Though technically we will not be meeting in Harrisburg per se, our hotel, the Penn Harris, is just across the beautiful Susquehanna River in Camp Hill, and offers excellent conference facilities. The program will be celebrating the new state-of-the-art Archives Building, a project a long time in coming. Our luncheon speaker, Anthea Hartig of the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History, will offer thoughts on Pennsylvania's place in our national history. We will feature current research on successful Harrisburg-area projects such as the Digital Harrisburg Project of Messiah University and a Friday afternoon plenary on the resurrection (so to speak) of Midland, an African American Cemetery, just recently placed on the National Register of Historic Places. We also hope you will attend in part, an archeology program at the State Museum on Saturday.

On this special anniversary of the PHA, we hope you will enjoy the conference offerings and engage with the forward-looking theme of "Future Visions of Pennsylvania and the Mid-Atlantic." Here's to another 90 years!

"The Future of the Past at the Pennsylvania State Archives"

State Archivist David Carmichael will discuss planning and execution of the new state-of-the-art Pennsylvania. Archives Building. Carmichael, a former state archivist of Georgia, also oversaw the building of a new state archives in Atlanta many years ago.

### About David Carmichael

Before coming to the PHMC, Carmichael directed the Georgia Division of Archives and History from 2000 to 2012. During his tenure, he oversaw the design and construction of the award-winning Georgia Archives building, introduced the Virtual Vault to provide online access to more than 1.5 million archival documents, and helped lead national efforts in emergency management, particularly for the protection of essential government records. In 2009, he was named a Distinguished Fellow of the Society of American Archivists. Carmichael holds a Master of Arts degree in History and Archives from Western Michigan University.

### Pennsylvania State Archives and the Pennsylvania Historical Association | Scholars in Residence Program, 2024

The Pennsylvania State Archives and the Pennsylvania Historical Association invite applications for the 2024 Scholars in Residence Program. The program provides support for up to four weeks of full-time research and study in manuscript and state record collections maintained by the Pennsylvania State Archives.

Residency programs are open to all who are conducting research on Pennsylvania history, including academic scholars, public sector professionals, independent scholars, graduate students, educators, writers, filmmakers, and others. Residencies may be scheduled for up to four weeks at any time during the period June 1, 2024–September 30, 2024; stipends are awarded at the rate of up to \$800 per week.

Applicants should conceive of research topics related to Pennsylvania history. Further, they should identify relevant archival collections, assess their availability and accessibility, and discuss their research agenda with appropriate staff prior to submitting a proposal. Because the State Archives and the Pennsylvania Historical Association are interested in making history meaningful and accessible to diverse audiences, research that is likely to result in widespread dissemination through nonspecialized publications, films, exhibitions, or other means is particularly welcome. Research topics that may have an impact on public policy are also most welcomed.

Applications will be evaluated by the following criteria: the significance of the research proposed; the clarity of the proposal; the quality of the work anticipated and the likelihood that the proposed project will be successfully completed; the relevance of the research topic to State Archives programs; the value of State Archives resources to the proposed topic, including the imaginative use of nontraditional sources; and plans for dissemination of the results of the research.
